Just a Thought about Commitment

Makes You go Hmm?

Like many other Neways’ distributors around the United States, we here in Arizona are anxiously awaiting the arrival of Phillip Day, the UK researcher and author of the internationally acclaimed book *Cancer: Why We’re Still Dying to Know the Truth*.

Phillip Day’s mission regarding the positive affects of B-17 on cancer is courageous and inspiring to say the least. In reverence of his purpose, we would like you to consider the following:

Last week I was reading an article about another man who had a very important vision as well. His name was Joseph Goldberger. Dr. Goldberger was a brilliant disease expert who at one time was not believed by his fellow doctors and even put his life at risk to prove his theory.

During the Civil War, a disease called pellagra was first noticed in the United States. Pellagra, Italian for “rough skin” and now almost forgotten, killed tens of thousands of people in this country.

The disease typically started out with hard rash patches or dermatitis like breakouts on the skin. The rash was followed by diarrhea, dementia, possible madness, and for about half of pellagra’s victims – death.

Pellagra occurred most commonly among poor farmers in the Southeast and in crowded places like prisons, asylums and orphanages. Obviously, public health officials were alarmed.

In 1915, the federal government sent Joseph Goldberger, to the Southeast to defeat pellagra. The common thought about the disease at that time was that it was caused by a germ and if someone could find how to eliminate the germ the disease would be under control.

Dr. Goldberger, began by studying several hundred victims at the Georgia State Sanitarium for the Insane. He didn't just study their symptoms, he studied their surroundings. He discovered that not one of the 293 nurses, attendants and other employees ever caught pellagra. Finally, he reached the startling conclusion that the disease wasn't being passed from patient to nurse because it wasn't caused by a germ. He had discovered an exception to the germ theory of disease.

His further research found the link between the poor farmers and their families and the inmates of the asylum: they all survived on a diet called the 3-M diet. The 3-M diet consisted of meat that was almost all fat, corn meal and molasses. The caretakers on the other hand, ate much more nutritious foods, including fresh meat, eggs, and milk.

To put his idea to the test, he convinced the state of Georgia to feed the children of two orphanages fresh food. Within weeks, the children with pellagra - even those near death - blossomed with health. Goldberger was overjoyed, but he wasn't believed. In fact, he was scorned as a failure and ridiculed because he came up with a crackpot diet theory instead.

Goldberger was determined. He furthered his point by *causing* pellagra by putting 12 volunteer prisoners on the 3-M diet. All the prisoners were affected by the diet and half broke out with the red rash of pellagra. Still, Goldberger was not believed.

As a last resort to prove that the disease was not caused by germs, Goldberger came up with an extreme test that he called the "filth party". He injected himself and an assistant with a pellagra sufferer's blood - no signs of the disease occurred. Then he and five others, including his wife, swallowed capsules packed with the skin cells, urine and feces of pellagra patients. Again, no one contracted the disease - but he still was not believed.

In 1934, almost 20 years after Goldberger's discoveries, a vitamin called niacin was discovered. This vitamin was missing in the 3-M diet. The

federal government immediately ordered that niacin be added to milk and certain other foods. The result? Pellagra disappeared almost overnight from America. But, tens of thousands of people who might have been saved had already died.

Joseph Goldberger had found a cure for pellagra and yet no one believed him. He risked his life trying to save people who were dying but his reward was lifelong frustration - his cure didn't fit the germ theory of disease, the ruling theory of the time. He died five years before niacin was discovered and at the time of his death, 300,000 people lay ill of pellagra, a disease still considered incurable.
